ALERT LEVEL 4

All persons who are able to work from home should do so.

Persons in the following list of industries and activities will be permitted to perform work outside the home, and to travel to and from work, under Alert Level 4, subject to:

- (a) strict health protocols, and social distancing rules;
- (b) return to work to be phased in to enable measures to make the workplace COVID-ready; and
- (c) return to work to be done in a manner that avoids and reduces risks of infection.

MEDIA AND ENTERTAINMENT SERVICES

1. Online services.
2. Productions for local broadcast and live streaming of creative sector services in support of COVID-19 subject to directions.
3. Newspapers and broadcasting

Minister of Co-operative Governance and Traditional Affairs, Dr Nkosazana Dlamini-Zuma, has published new regulations which outline the restrictions under South Africa's level 4 lockdown, including the introduction of a new curfew.

Under section 16(3) of the new regulations, all South Africans are confined to their place of residence from 20h00 until 05h00 every day.

The only exception to this rule is where:

- A person has been granted a permit to perform an essential or permitted service;
- A person is attending to a security emergency;
- A person is attending to a medical emergency.

The new permit appears to be separate from the certificate which was provided to essential services by the Companies and Intellectual Property Commission (CIPC) during the country's level 5 restrictions and is included as a separate annexure in the regulations.

It states that any person leaving their homes during the curfew hours must also carry some form of identification with them at all times. Failing to do so, they will be required to return home immediately, even if they have a valid permit.

Both the employee and the institution which employs are required to fill out the form with the necessary identification details.

Below, is a copy of what this permit looks like.

DISASTER MANAGEMENT ACT REGULATIONS

On 29 April 2020, new Regulations were published in terms of the Disaster Management Act which replaced previous lockdown regulations and set out the restrictions that will be imposed during Alert Level 4. These Regulations permit more categories of business to resume operations, subject to the establishment of, and compliance with, strict health protocols and social distancing measures in the workplace. Here are 5 factors that employers should take note of in preparing for Alert Level 4:

1. Movement of persons

- Both essential service employees and permitted service employees may travel between their place of residence and work.
- Essential service and permitted service employers must issue their employees with a permit corresponding with Form 2, Annexure A (attached) of the Regulations.
- Essential service and permitted service employees, in possession of a permit, are allowed to travel between provinces, metropolitan areas and districts if they have to cross these borders to commute to work on a daily basis.
- All persons are confined to their residences between the hours of 20:00 and 05:00, except where a person has been granted a permit to perform an essential or permitted service or is attending to a security or medical emergency.

2. Workplace plan

- Before resuming business operations, all permitted industries, businesses and entities must establish and implement a workplace plan.
- The workplace plan must include (Annexure B) details of the plan for the gradual return to work of employees; details of the health and social distancing measures that will be implemented at work-stations, canteens and bathroom facilities; and the appointment of a COVID-19 compliance officer to oversee the implementation of the workplace plan.
- Employers with over 500 employees must include details of the establishment and implementation of testing facilities in their workplace plan.

3. Employees in the workplace

- More employees will be allowed to return to work so employers are now required to adopt minimum measures to reduce the risk of infection at the workplace and minimise the spread of the virus.
- Measures must include: enabling employees who are able to do so to work from home and minimising face-to-face meetings.
- 'Special measures' must be put in place for identified employees with comorbidities (that is, existing medical conditions) and employees above the age of 60.
- Employers whose employees come into contact with members of the public in the course of their duties are required to provide these employees with cloth masks which must be worn.

4. The business premises

- Employers must measure the area of their premises in square meters and determine the maximum allowable number of persons on the premises at any given time, in compliance with the social distancing requirements;
- Employers must appoint an employee as a COVID-19 compliance officer who will be responsible for ensuring:
 - compliance with the workplace plan;
 - that the maximum number of employees and customers is not exceeded;
 - that social distancing of 1.5 metres between each person is observed both inside and outside of the workplace;
 - that hand sanitizer is provided at the entrance and exit to the workplace for use by both employees and customers.
- Employers must use the COVID-19 Directive on Health and Safety in the Workplace, published by the Minister of Employment and Labour on 29 April 2020, as a guide on what measures to implement at the workplace.

5. Specific requirements for certain sectors

- Certain sectors that have been allowed to resume operations are subject to special provisions. For example, retail stores that are permitted to operate are prohibited from selling goods other than those specified in Table 1, Part E of the Regulations.
- Table 1 also provides for the percentage of operation permitted to operate and imposes a limitation on operating times for certain sectors. For example, other than the particular manufacturing industries listed in Part C of Table 1, all other manufacturers may only scale up to 30% of their employees and are subject to strict health protocols. Restaurants may only operate and deliver food between 09:00 and 19:00.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. *When is alert level 4 starting?*

Alert level 4 will be in effect from 1 May 2020

2. *Can a funeral take place?*

- (1) Movement between a province, metropolitan area or district by a person wishing to attend a funeral shall only be permitted if that person so wishing to attend the funeral is a: -
 - (a) spouse or partner of the deceased;
 - (b) child of the deceased, whether biological, adopted or stepchild;
 - (c) child-in-law of the deceased;
 - (d) parent of the deceased whether biological, adopted or stepparent;
 - (e) sibling, whether biological, adopted or stepbrother or sister of the deceased; (f) or grandparent of the deceased;
- (2) Attendance at a funeral is limited to 50 people and will not be regarded as a prohibited gathering.
- (3) Night vigils at a funeral is banned.
- (4) During a funeral. all hygienic conditions and distancing measures must be adhered to for the limitation of exposure of persons at the funeral to COVID-19.
- (5) Each person, whether traveling alone or not, wishing to attend a funeral and who has to travel between districts, or between provinces to attend a funeral must obtain a permit which corresponds substantially with Form 4 of Annexure A, from his or her nearest magistrate's office or police station to travel to the funeral and back.
- (6) The head of court, or a person designated by him or her, or a station commander of a police station or a person designated by him or her, may issue the permit to travel to a funeral.
- (7) Upon a request for a permit to attend a funeral. a person requesting a permit must produce a death certificate or a certified copy of the death certificate to the head of court, or a person designated by him or her, or a station commander of a police station or a person designated by him or her; Provided that where a death certificate is not yet available, and the funeral must be held within 24 hours in keeping with cultural and religious practices. the person requesting the permit must make a sworn affidavit which corresponds with Form 5 of Annexure A, together with a letter from a cultural or religious leader confirming the need for the funeral within 24 hours.

- (8) Only two family members or a person with a close affiliation to the deceased may, with the required permits, be present in the vehicle transporting the mortal remains to the metropolitan or district area, or province where the funeral will take place; provided that the cause of death of the deceased being transported is non -COVID -19 related.
- (9) The Regulations for the use of public transport must be strictly adhered to when travelling.
- (10) A copy of the permit issued and the death certificate or sworn affidavit made, must be kept safely by the head of court, or station commander of a police station for record keeping for a period of three months after the national state of disaster has ended, where after it may be destroyed.
- (11) All forms must be completed in full, including full names, identification or passport numbers and full contact details as required in the form and failure to do so will result in the form being rejected as invalid.

3. *Can I travel to another province or district?*

Amended directions on movements of persons and goods (Gazette 43293 of 7 May 2020):

2. (a) The movement of persons and goods, where:

- new lease agreements were entered into before or during the lockdown period: or
 - the transfer of immovable property occurred before the lockdown period, requires a change in place of residence, including the transport of goods to a new place of residence, within the Republic.
- (b) The circumstances in subparagraph (a) require the once-off movement of persons who are relocating to their new place of residence, as permitted in terms of regulation 16(5); and
- (c) The transport of goods within the Republic is permitted in terms of regulation 22(1)(f).

The once-off movement of persons and transportation of goods:

3. (a) A person who needs to travel to his or her new place of residence and to transport goods, which are limited to household furniture and effects, as required by the circumstances in paragraph 2 of these Directions, is permitted to do so between the period 7 May 2020 to 7 June 2020.
- (b) A person referred to in subparagraph (a) must:
- obtain a permit to travel across provincial, metropolitan or district boundaries from the station commander of a police station or a person designated by him or her The permit must correspond to Form 1 to these Directions;
 - indicate the persons who are part of the household who will be required to move; and

- have in his or her possession the relevant lease agreement indicating the date of expiry of the old lease and the date of commencement of the new lease, or the transfer documents attesting to the change in place of residence or change of ownership of property.

Public and private transport:

4. A person referred to in paragraph 3 who makes use of public or private transport must adhere to the relevant Directions issued by the Minister of Transport.

Short title and commencement:

5. These Directions are called the Directions on the once-off movement of persons and the transportation of goods for purposes of relocation and commence on 7 May 2020.

Movement between provinces, metropolitan areas and districts are prohibited except:

- (a) for workers who have a permit to perform an essential or permitted service who have to commute to and from work on a daily basis;
- (b) the attendance of a funeral, as allowed;
- (c) the transportation of mortal remains; and
- (d) for learners who have to commute to and from school or higher education institutions on a daily basis during periods when those institutions are permitted to operate.

4. What goods are essential?

- 1 - Food products, including non-alcoholic beverages and animal food.
- 2 - The sale of hot cooked food, only for home delivery.
- 3 - Toilet Paper, sanitary pads, sanitary tampons, and condoms.
- 4 - Hand sanitiser, disinfectants, soap, alcohol for industrial use, household cleaning products, and personal protective equipment.
- 5 - Products for the care of babies and toddlers.
- 6 - Personal toiletries, including haircare, body, face, hand and foot care products, roll-ons, deodorants, dental care products.
- 7 - Medical and Hospital Supplies, medicine, equipment and personal protective equipment.
- 8 - Fuel and lighting, including coal, wood, paraffin and gas.
- 9 - Airtime and electricity.
- 10 - Hardware, components and supplies.
- 12 - Components for vehicles undergoing emergency repairs
- 13 - Chemicals, packaging and ancillary products used in the production of any these products listed in Part E.

- 14 - Textiles required to produce face masks and other personal protective equipment and winter clothing.
- 15 - Winter clothing, footwear, bedding and heaters and the components and fabrics required to manufacture these.
- 16 - Children's clothing and fabrics and components required to manufacture these.
- 17 - Stationery and educational books.
- 18 - Personal ICT equipment including computers, mobile telephones and other home office equipment.
- 19 - No sale of liquor permitted.
